**Tax Benefits for Preserving Open Space**

Open space preservation has always been important in Worcester. Over 1100 acres (more than 10 percent of the township) are now protected or preserved from development. Privately or publicly owned land that is preserved with a conservation easement helps maintain Worcester's rural heritage by retaining our fields, woods, and working farms. It helps control stormwater runoff and allows rainwater to replenish our streams and aquifers, and it slows the rising tide of school taxes.

Permanently preserving open space can benefit the landowner as well. Landowners who donate a conservation easement on their land by December 31, 2007, will benefit from increased tax savings for up to 15 years. This tax benefit is in addition to the reduction in capital gains taxes on the sale of highly appreciated property, and a deduction for preserved land on federal estate taxes. Properties as small as 10 to 15

acres can qualify for these tax deductions.

These tax benefits, plus a strong desire to see her land preserved, recently motivated a Worcester resident to donate a conservation easement on her property. The easement will be held by The Conservancy of Montgomery County, a local land trust that specializes in historic properties. The cost of the endowment and some of the expenses associated with the transaction will be paid by the township. In return, the township gains the benefit of the additional acres of permanently preserved open space, which will be maintained by the landowner and monitored by the Conservancy forever.

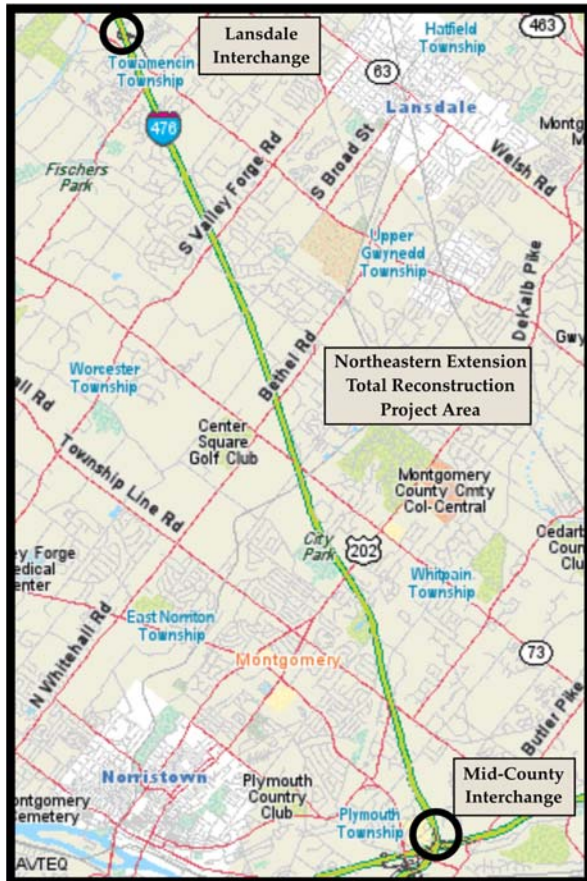

# PA Turnpike Extension Total Reconstruction Project



### Project Area

The project area begins at the Mid-County Interchange (exit #20) and continues north to the Lansdale Interchange (exit #31). The project involves the total reconstruction and widening of 10.5 miles of the Turnpike’s Northeastern Extension (I-476). The project area traverses five townships – Plymouth, Whitpain, Worcester, Upper Gwynedd, and Towamencin.

### Project Description

The project consists of the full depth total roadway reconstruction of 10.5 miles of the Pennsylvania Turnpike’s Northeastern Extension. The existing four-lane roadway, with two 12-foot travel lanes northbound and southbound, a 4-foot median and 8 to 10-foot shoulders will be converted into a six-lane roadway with three 12-foot travel lanes northbound and southbound, a 26-foot median, and 12-foot shoulders.

This project also includes the replacement of eight overhead bridges, eleven mainline bridges, lengthening culverts, and constructing storm water detention basins and other drainage improvements at various locations throughout the project limits. Improvements to the Lansdale Interchange include reconstructing the roadway from the Turnpike to the existing toll plaza, adding two more E-Z Pass only ramps (“auxiliary” ramps) between the Turnpike and Sumneytown Pike, and adding an auxiliary ramp from Towamencin Avenue to the toll plaza area. ## The Pennsylvania Turnpike Reconstruction and Worcester Township

In this newsletter you will find information supplied to the township concerning the proposed widening of the Northeast Extension of the PA Turnpike. John Cornell, Worcester Township Manager, and two of the supervisors attended the presentation that the Turnpike Commission gave to township officials on March 29th. Worcester's Emergency Management Coordinator attended the second presentation on Tuesday April 10 and filed a complete report of potential safety and traffic issues on Wednesday April 11<sup>th</sup> with the Township.

We are currently evaluating how the widening of the turnpike will affect township residents. We have received calls requesting sound barriers along the portions that pass by Sunnybrook Estates and those near Weber Road. We have heard concerns about the water run-off issue and the destruction of numerous mature trees that currently provide sound barriers, as well as taking portions of property and impacting quality of life. In addition, our Emergency Management Coordinator has targeted several issues that appear to be of concern.

We are concerned with several proposed items. The closure of the Morris Road and Bustard Road Bridges, among others, for several months, will impact traffic patterns, pushing motorists onto neighborhood streets that are not designed to handle the volume. The issue of emergency vehicles having access while bridges are closed must also be addressed.

As we find out more about the plan, the impact it will have on us and our neighboring townships, we will be able to give residents more information. Please be assured that we are closely watching the plans and will do our best to minimize the effects on township residents.

Turnpike representatives will be at the May 16, 2007 Board of Supervisors meeting to meet with residents.

## Worcester Honored by Montco Lands Trust

In late 2006 Worcester Township was honored in a presentation from the Montgomery County Lands Trust. Worcester was one of six communities in Montgomery County honored for their “outstanding achievements and efforts demonstrating exemplary land protection, effective partnerships, and visionary open space projects”. The Montgomery County Lands Trust is a non profit organization founded in 1993 and dedicated to preservation of green space and education on tools to promote smart growth, within Montgomery County. One of the founding members of the Lands Trust was State Representative Kate Harper, who remains chairperson.

Worcester received the Outstanding Achievement Award for “Outside the Box Thinking, using all available tools”. Supervisors Chase Kneeland and Arthur Bustard attended the ceremony and accepted the award on behalf of the township. Worcester’s open space program was cited as an example to other municipalities. “The results of Worcester’s creative vision has led not just to increased open space, but a commitment to work in partnership with the state, county and residents to assure everyone has a voice in land conservation.” The Montgomery County Lands Trust Award noted that Worcester uses all available methods to protect the green spaces and preserve our quality of life, and held us up as an example of how to be effective to our fellow municipalities in Montgomery County. We are honored that a Montgomery County organization (that has worked closely with County Government on the recent bond issue for open space preservation) has taken notice of Worcester’s efforts to protect our citizens and our standard of living.
