## What's Happening in Worcester - 2008 Year End Report

As we head into a new year, I wanted to take this opportunity to report some of the things that your Township was able to achieve in 2008. Much of the thanks go to our staff, including both the office and road crew, plus unpaid volunteers on our Planning Commission, Zoning Hearing Board and our newly formed Park and Recreation Task Force.

Back in 2004, the township commissioned a Greenway Study that looked at the possibilities for a trail network inter-connecting all parts of the township with our various parks and other resources. This year we completed the first leg of the recommended trail system: a 0.4 mile segment that goes from Greenhill Road to Hollow Road along the Zacharias Creek. That segment is open for public use, with a parking area at the Greenhill Road entrance. An additional 2.9 miles of trail is currently being planned, funded by about half of our county open space allocation. When completed, it will connect the trail system in Evansburg Park to Worcester's Heebner Park.

In 2008 the township purchased a new dump truck for road maintenance use, two new mowers, and completed two new pavilions in Heebner Park; both with restroom facilities and one with a canteen area. We repaired a bridge abutment on Wentz's Church Road and improved culverts and drainage on the same road, among other projects. A bid for a new public works building was accepted in December.

Earlier this year we switched to a new medical insurance package for township employees. We increased coverage, allowing the staff more flexibility, while creating an annual savings to the township of over \$20,000, compared to the previous policy.

Worcester's Park and Recreation Task Force was formed in October. The 12 volunteer members, selected from all parts of the township, will be working on identifying the various needs the township has for recreational opportunities, and how best to utilize the township's resources to accomplish that goal. We are expecting their report around the middle of 2009. They are seeking your input via a survey, also in this newsletter and available online at [www.worcestertwp.com](http://www.worcestertwp.com).

In December, the supervisors adopted a new Comprehensive Plan for the township replacing the last one, adopted in 1995. A Comprehensive Plan studies, in detail, the varied needs, demographics and resources of the township and sets goals for zoning, transportation,

recreation, open space and much more. It is the "road map" that township officials use when making major decisions about the township's future. The Plan is posted on the township web site: [www.worcestertwp.com](http://www.worcestertwp.com).

In 2008, we welcomed 3 new full-time members to our staff. Tiffany Loomis came on board in November as a land use officer to assist with zoning and enforcement matters. We have been working to cross train our office staff in order to make sure we are covered at all times. Jack Kelly joined our public works crew last July, and Doug Fennimore was welcomed aboard in September. We also saw the retirement of long time public works manager Perry Schultz in June.

We have reorganized the public works department responsibilities and have been working on improving their training schedules. We expect that we will be able to bring more projects in house that had been subcontracted in the past. This will result in increased efficiency, faster response time, and decreased costs for township maintenance.

We have been working on improving snow plowing and salting operations for the winter. Township Manager John Cornell has reorganized the plowing schedule, we have repaired the equipment, and are planning on filling the salt trucks when the forecast recommends it, so that we are ready to move when the need arises. We have an agreement with a township contractor to plow several subdivisions in the Township, including Sunnybrook on North Wales Road, in order to make sure the roads are cleared in a more timely manner this year.




## GETTYSBURG

### 2009 BUDGET

At the December 17<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Township Supervisors, the 2009 Budget was approved. The Township Staff labored for several months in preparing this budget and the Supervisors unanimously approved it. We have again provided a budget that allows us to provide services to our residents without a tax increase. The staff was instructed to prepare a budget that was conservative in revenue expectations, while meeting all of the important needs of the Township. Increased efficiencies, recent capital expenditures to upgrade facilities, and the improved condition of the Township roads allowed us to cover the Township needs and still bring forward a balanced budget that conservative revenue estimates will cover, all without tax increases.

### OPEN SPACE

Since I last reported on open space preservation in the fall of 2007, there have been several large parcels preserved using a wide variety of methods. In December 2007, the township joined with Montgomery County to preserve the 21-acre farm of Oliver and Rosalie Smith (Fisher Road). If you drive by, look for the Smith's herd of Belted Galloway cattle. In June, the Montgomery County Farm Board approved the preservation of the 16-acre horse farm belonging to Dorothy (DeeDee) McGrane on Stump Hall Road. Her property connects to the already-preserved Schierenbeck farm. Both farms now include trail easements that will eventually be part of the trail network extending to Evansburg Park.

The 106-acre farm of Frank D'Lauro (Valley Forge Road) was left in Frank's will in part to his

cousin John D'Lauro, and the remainder to the Natural Lands Trust. The full property is subject to a conservation easement, with the possibility for a trail in the future. A voluntary easement granted by Cindy Haines (North Wales Road) has preserved her 14-acre property. The township participated by agreeing to cover the administrative costs of the easement in hopes of inspiring others to pursue similar voluntary preservation of their properties. Another preservation project in 2008 was the 81-acre Moran property on Grange Avenue. The Montgomery County Lands Trust lead the way and funding was provided by the county (50%), the state (34%) and Worcester Township (16%) to place a permanent conservation easement on the property. The township's portion of the funding came from the generous annual donations made by township resident David Markel over the past 7 years. The Moran tract was rated in the top 10% of all non-developed land in a 15-county region of Southeast Pennsylvania by Natural Lands Trust's Smart Conservation Model, as extremely important land for preservation.

And we are very close to finalizing the purchase of 7-acres, known as Heyser Field (Griffith Road near Valley Forge Road), where the annual Farmers' Union Horse Show is held. This will use the balance of our county open space allocation and will provide a township park right in Fairview Village, adjacent to the Community Hall. We expect to make final settlement early in 2009.

Those are some of the highlights from 2008. But just as important are all the daily duties that our staff fulfills to keep our streets plowed and safe, our grass mowed, and all of our zoning and administrative duties in order. They do a great job and help to make Worcester a special place where we are all proud to live. Speaking for the supervisors and staff, we all hope you have a wonderful and healthy New Year.

## Help Us Help You this Winter

When it comes to clearing the snow and ice from township roads, it is a joint effort between the Worcester Township public works department, PennDOT and private communities and contractors.

You can help make the process go as smoothly as possible by remembering a few simple guidelines:

- Please keep parked vehicles off the street before, during and after a snowfall.
- Do not throw snow onto the roadway when shoveling.
- Remove snow from the end of your driveway and from around your mailbox. Shovel snow to the right of your driveway to avoid having the plows push the



snow back into your driveway.

- Mailboxes that are directly hit by a township plow will be replaced.
- Shovel an area for trash and recycling containers on your curb or driveway. Please do not place them in the street.
- Parents, remember to keep an eye on your children when playing in the snow. It is extremely dangerous to play or stand in or near the street when plows are working.
- Please do not leave sleds or other toys in the street.



## Electric bills to rise dramatically in 2010: Worcester Township implements savings and conservation measures.

The Pennsylvania Electrical Generation Customer Choice and Competition Act of 1996 was designed to increase competition and lower prices for electricity. Part of that act capped charges for electric at the 1996 levels for a specific period of time. Those caps are expiring over the next two years for various electric companies and increases in rates are expected to be substantial. While this was not the intended objective of the governmental act, it appears to be the result. PECO Energy and Philadelphia Electric's cap will expire the end of 2010 unless legislation is passed to extend them. The cost of coal and natural gas that powers most of Pennsylvania's power plants has risen in the past ten years, as have environmental regulations on those power plants, creating an upward spiral of costs.

Worcester Township has been watching the situation and has been taking proactive steps to improve the potential effect on our budget. We observed that in 2006 when the rate caps were removed from Pike County Light and Power, the cost of electricity increased there by 72 percent. We do not expect this to happen in our area, but increases of 20-30% are possible. In order to minimize the effect of the potential increase and cut our usage of electricity, we had an energy audit performed on the township's administration building. The results of the audit indicated we could save electricity by changing the light fixtures to energy saving fluorescent bulbs. It detected areas in need of additional insulation that we remedied, resulting in decreased cooling costs in the summer and lower fuel bills in the winter. The results of the audit indicated that we will be able to save enough in the first year to pay for all the changes suggested, and enjoy the benefits of a more productive workplace.

In 2007, Worcester began installing LED lights at various traffic signals in the township. Analysis indicated significant savings in electric costs which was an important factor, in addition to substantial savings from lower maintenance costs due to the longer lifetime of the bulbs. PECO charges the township a flat fee based on estimated electrical usage per intersection light. Prior to the LED lights, the monthly charge for all traffic lights was approximately \$1,300. In 2008, after a timing delay with PECO, the Township's traffic light account was credited over \$6,000 for prior year savings. As a result, the Township will not incur an electric bill for intersection lights for over two and a half years. After that, the monthly cost will be reduced to approximately \$210. The cost to the township to install the LED's was substantial, but the savings are much greater.

A consultant has reviewed the wastewater treatment plants to ensure motors and equipment are in optimal working order. Several units were identified for corrections and updated to handle peak loads and increased usage without incurring additional electrical cost. The correct conversion and sizing of these facilities will result in a reduction of maintenance and associated costs. In an unrelated savings note, a new program of line and pipe inspections will reduce potential issues before they happen.

In 2008, new bathroom facilities were built in Heebner Park and we are monitoring electrical usage of the hot water heaters and the heating units to insure the insulation and temperature control is sufficient to maximize efficiency.

In 2009, we will continue to evaluate our energy usage and identify new ways in which we can constantly conserve.

**Worcester Township Helps Residents Preserve Land**

Over a year ago, long-time resident Cindy Haines began the process of preserving her 14-acre farm on North Wales Road by arranging to donate a conservation easement to The Conservancy of Montgomery County. Her actions insured that the farm's headwater spring and pond that feed the Stony Creek, as well as the pre-1720 brick house, will remain untouched.

Although such a donation can have significant income tax and estate tax advantages, it also entails expenses to hire an appraiser, attorney, surveyor, and tax consultant. In addition, the land trust requires an endowment to ensure that the organization will have the resources to monitor and defend the easement forever.

Worcester Township's Board of Supervisors recognized the value of Mrs. Haines' donation to all township residents in preserving important natural and historic resources as well as helping to hold down school taxes. For this reason, the township agreed to underwrite the administrative costs of the donation, up to \$15,000. The Board also announced the township's willingness to consider other such requests, as an incentive to encourage other landowners to donate conservation easements that will preserve open space and natural resources. This innovative program demonstrates the township's commitment to partnering with landowners in preserving Worcester's rural and agricultural heritage to benefit residents now, and to provide a legacy for future generations.
