Center for Loss & Bereavement serves those in need

When Worcester resident Christine Smith met Shirley Elrod over ten years ago, through a mutual acquaintance, each found a perfect partner in the other to achieve a desire to serve a quiet and suffering segment of the population.

Fast forward to 2010, and The Center for Loss and Bereavement in Skippack is celebrating its tenth anniversary.

When faced with the loss of her sister and nephew in an auto accident, Christine knew firsthand of the unique grief experienced with such an event. What Christine and Shirley both envisioned was a place that would "offer a warm and safe atmosphere" that would allow others a place to "express and explore their thoughts and emotions while grieving."

In 2000, the center began with short-term support groups and some counseling services. Through a focused vision to become a comprehensive resource, the Center now offers a broad and diverse complement of services including but not limited to grief counseling for all ages, specialized support groups, Clara, a Golden Retriever therapy dog, and professional trainings that offer CEU and ACT 48 credits.

With the generous support of a family foundation, Nello's Corner was implemented in 2003. This program is a child-specific bereavement support program. In 2005, Camp Millie, named after Christine's mother, was launched as a summer program for children. The camp is held at Worcester's Variety Club.

Co-founder Shirley Elrod emphasizes that The Center is an approachable community resource. No physician referrals are required, please, just call.

2010 Road Improvements – Completed

Mill Road between Valley Forge & Merrybrook Roads: Pavement repairs/underdrain/swale; milling of curb lines/intersections/driveway entrances; bituminous seal coat; level and overlay.

Kriebel Mill Road between Heebner and Fawn Roads: Remove & replace existing pipe crossing; selective pavement repairs.

Green Hill Road between Anders Road and Skippack Pike: Selective milling and overlay.

Berks Road between Skippack Pike and Morris Road: Pavement repairs/underdrain/swale; milling of curb lines/intersections/driveway entrances; bituminous seal coat; level & overlay.

Quarry Hall Road between Dell and Water Street Roads: Remove and replace existing pipe crossing.

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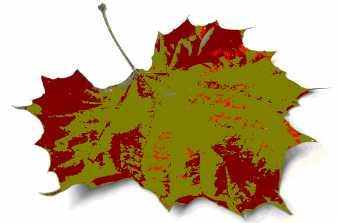

Dos & Don'ts of Leaf Collection

With fall upon us, leaf raking is here as well. This can be a peaceful afternoon activity or a family tradition.

Here is our top ten list of things to do (and not do) with your fall leaves.

10. DO -- Get the family together and rake a big leaf pile at the edge of your lawn. When the kids are done jumping in it, rake it off the lawn into a pile that will shrink and compost over the winter. In the spring, use it for mulch in the garden.
9. DO -- Run the lawn mower over your leaves and mow them into the lawn, giving the grass instant protection from winter weather plus a slow-release fertilizer next spring.
8. DO -- If you have too many leaves to mow them in place, run the lawnmower over them and collect the shredded leaves in one spot. This do-it-yourself compost pile will turn into wonderful black organic matter for vegetable and flower beds.
7. DO -- If you can't use leaf compost on your property, maybe a neighbor can. See if your neighbor wants to haul away your bagged leaves or shredded leaf mulch.
6. DO -- Collect your leaves for your trash hauler. Pennsylvania's Act 101 requires that leaf waste be separated from your regular trash. As a result of this State Law, your hauler is required to have a designated day for leaf collection every fall. You should receive a notice from your hauler telling you when that collection will take place, and directing you how to prepare your leaf waste for collection.
5. DO -- Take your unwanted leaves to Worcester's drop-off facility in between designated leaf collection days. Barnside Farm Compost Facility is located at 991 Halderman Road, Schwenksville, 19473. 610-287-8880.
4. DON'T -- Residents in the five southeastern counties of Pennsylvania are not allowed to burn leaves. Because leaves burn at a low temperature, they create a lot of smoke. The air becomes loaded with particles that are small enough to travel inside your house, even with windows closed. For those who suffer from asthma and allergies, the smoke from burning leaves can be uncomfortable and even dangerous.
3. DON'T -- Besides being illegal, burning leaves is a fire risk. A quick change in the wind is all it takes for an outdoor fire to get out of control and cause a disaster.
2. DON'T -- Burning leaves creates a neighborhood nuisance. It's not appealing to smell heavy smoke on your clean laundry. When thermal inversions trap all the pollutants at ground level, burning leaves add plumes of thick smoke to the air, making air pollution even worse.
1. DON'T -- Throwing leaves in the trash wastes a valuable resource and is also illegal. Pennsylvania law requires communities like Worcester to reduce household waste and recycle valuable material. Leaves must be sent to an approved recycling facility if they are not composted on your property. Your trash hauler will take your leaves to a recycling facility on your leaf collection day.



Loose Pets & Leash Laws



Leash laws apply to all pets. When your pet is off your property, it must be on a leash. Pets are not allowed to run loose in Worcester Township or in any Montgomery County municipality. If your pet is outside on your property, you must have some type of system in place to ensure it does not leave your property. If your pet is found running loose, especially in Township parks, it may be picked up and taken to the Montgomery County SPCA as a stray. All fines are assessed to the owner. If your pet escapes and you are unable to find it, call the Montgomery County Animal Control office at 610-287-1426. You can also file a Lost & Found Pet Form with the Animal Control office.

Proposed Zoning Amendments

The Worcester Township Board of Supervisors, Planning Commission and Administrative Staff have been diligently working on various changes and additions to the current Worcester Township Zoning Ordinance to better protect and aid in the daily life of our residents.

The proposed zoning amendments would revise the definition of "agriculture," revise the usages allowed in the Limited Industrial District to include research, establish setbacks for tennis and private sports courts, and increase the height of fences allowed in side and rear yards to provide more privacy options for residents.

The public hearing to consider these zoning amendments is scheduled for Wednesday, December 15, 2010 at 7:30pm at the Worcester Township Community Hall (1031 Valley Forge Road). The proposed amendments may be viewed at the township office (1721 Valley Forge Road) or on our web site (www.worcestertwp.com). Help Us Help You This Winter

When it comes to clearing the snow and ice from township roads, it is a joint effort involving the Worcester Township Public Works Department, PennDOT and private contractors. You can help make the process go as smoothly as possible by observing these simple guidelines:

- Please keep parked vehicles off the street before, during and after a snowfall, and do not throw snow onto the roadway when shoveling.
- Remove snow from the end of your driveway and from around your mailbox. Shovel snow to the right of your driveway to avoid having the plows push the snow back into your driveway.
- If you believe your mailbox has been struck and destroyed by a snow plow, please contact the Roadmaster (610-584-1410) within one week of the damage for an inspection to determine the cause. If the Roadmaster determines that the damage was caused by a "direct hit" by a snow plow, the Township may compensate a property owner in an amount not to exceed \$75. The Township will not compensate property owners for damages resulting from snow spraying from plow trucks, or for any cause other than a "direct hit" by a snow plow.
- Shovel an area for trash and recycling containers on your curb or driveway. Please do not place them in the street.
- Parents, remember to keep an eye on your children when playing in the snow. It is extremely dangerous to play or stand in or near the street when plows are working.
